'If you really knew me' at CHS

CHS Principal Virdie Montgomery called it a chance to build unity or family on his campus as he and his staff led students through an activity where they could learn more about each other and perhaps come to realize that many other students were going through circumstances similar to their own. Staff chose the early release day on Feb. 14 to have the campus-wide program.

Montgomery said the idea came from class officers and was based on a TV show called "If You Really Knew Me." The object of the exercise was to get students to know one another and show empathy toward each other.

Students were randomly divided into nine groups of 50 students with CHS staff acting as facilitators. Students shared their experiences of being bullied, losing a parent to illness or divorce and other unfortunate events.

"I realized that students were really stepping out of their comfort zone and sharing deeply from their heart," said Glenda Henderson, CHS teacher and group facilitator.

"The activities prompted many students to realize that they are not the only ones walking a challenging path in their life at school or home," she added.
